Summer Swims

Summer saw not one but two charity swims taking place in support of the children's hospital.

Seven-year-old Jodie Cheetham swam **32 lengths** to help raise money for a mobile CT Scanner at the hospital. Taking 38 minutes to complete the longest swim she has done raising over **£122**.

While **10-year-old patient Peter Charman** from Lancaster made a splash after bringing his swim challenge forward after finding out he needed another operation at the children's hospital. Peter took to the swimming pool at Lancaster University to swim **40 lengths** - the equivalent of **1km**. Peter took his final stroke to complete the distance in just over half an hour and still had energy to play in the pool afterwards, raising over **£3,300!**

Ready, Steady, Ho!

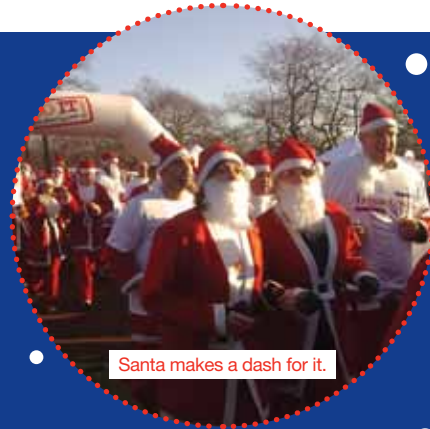
Get into the festive spirit and join us at Heaton Park on 11 December for a 5km Santa Dash.

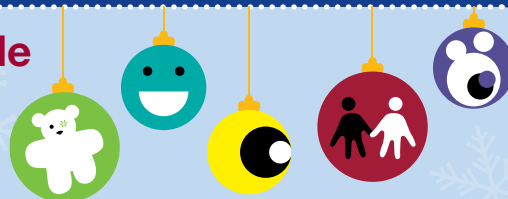
Grand Christmas Raffle

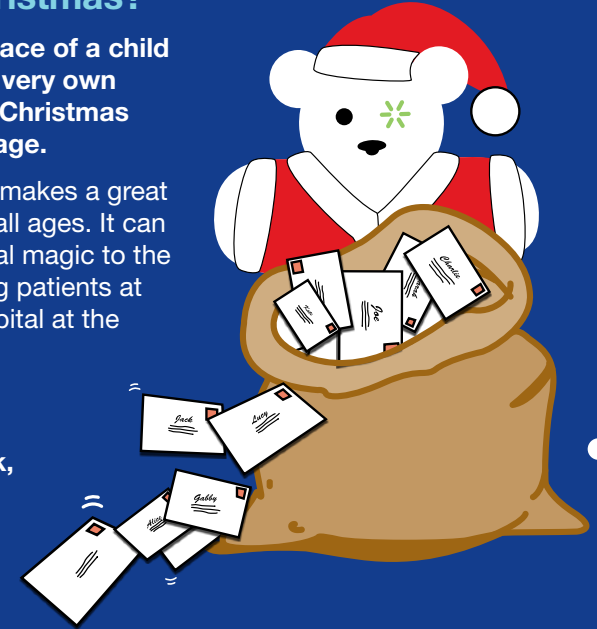

Projects funding

Scanning Ahead

This Christmas we are supporting a project which will benefit patients within the orthopaedic department at Royal Manchester Children's Hospital and will reduce the number of times a child is exposed to radiation through an x-ray.

The department currently uses a scanner known as a Quantec scanner but the technology was developed twenty years ago. We are supporting a project that will provide a brand new state-of-the-art scanner known as Formetric 2.

This scanner is very important when treating children with orthopaedic conditions especially relating to the shape of the back. The scanner enables examination of the shape of a child without taking an x-ray. The scan enables a 3D visualisation and reconstruction of the spine to be made resulting in a better assessment of a deformity and checking the outcomes of spinal correction surgery.

To enable us to provide this state-of-the-art equipment for our patients we need to raise £40,000. If you can lend a hand and support our Christmas project please text CMAS11 £3 to 70070. The donation will be added to your monthly bill or taken from your phone credit.

Spinal Surgeon, Neil Oxborrow explains how the scanner will help patients he treats with Scoliosis.

Scoliosis is a complex deformity of the spine. This has a huge affect on children in terms of the way they see themselves through the important period of adolescence and growth. Scoliosis can progress into adult life and eventually have an effect on pain and function if it becomes severe.

The standard test looks at x-rays which are a poor reflection on what the patient actually sees. The Formetric scanner would allow us to look at the shape of a child's back to see exactly what influence

the scoliosis is having and how our treatments affect this.

This scanner will be able to monitor our treatment, help us to understand what forms of treatment work best to reduce the deformity but it will also enable us to cut down significantly on the number of x-rays a child has, reducing their exposure to radiation.

This scanner will be of enormous benefit to our patients and has the potential to make a difference not only to the treatment we can provide but also to a child's self esteem – making their hospital experience better.

Getting People Moving

To make a difference to patients who have been affected by stroke, spinal, orthopaedic and neurological disorders we are fundraising to purchase a **Body Weight Support System and Gait Trainer** for Manchester Royal Infirmary.

Often with these conditions the way in which a patient walks or their sequence of foot movements are affected. This state-of-the-art gait trainer will make it easier to monitor a patient's progress and provide audio and visual feedback of step length and speed. The body weight support system provides assistance by bearing a patient's weight and enabling them to gain back their confidence, strength and stride.

Combining these two pieces of equipment and providing this system will allow every patient to get an early start on their rehabilitation and on their way to recovery.

The cost of helping our patients to improve their ability to walk by providing this system is **£18,000**.

Craig's Cycle Challenge

Craig Green and his father took on the challenge of the **Manchester to Blackpool** Bike Ride to raise money for the Cleft Lip and Palate Unit who have looked after Craig's son.

Artwork Project

Manchester Royal Eye Hospital

Trial Looks at Improving Eye Conditions

Charitable funds have been contributing to a research trial at the eye hospital that could see a less invasive method of testing being used to diagnose and treat eye conditions.



A trial is currently under way using a multispectral camera, which uses different wavelengths of light to look at blood oxygenation at the back of the eye. The trial is to see whether it can help to diagnose Macular Degeneration and eye problems associated with Diabetes Mellitus in a less invasive way than the current way of injecting a yellow dye into the bloodstream which can cause side effects.
